





Anatomy dissection — pig heart



Students in Anatomy and Physiology Class have been studying the cardiovascular system in class. On March 7, 2017, students were put into groups and dissected a pig heart.

Students began by measuring the length and width of their heart and recording their data. Next, students cut through the pericardium and continued cutting until the pericardium was removed so that students could examine the rest of the heart. Students were then asked to record the texture of both the heart and the pericardium.

Next, students cut through the heart and were asked to identify the left and right atrium, the left and right ventricle, the apex of the heart, and the base of the heart.

Senior Alexis Mitchell commented, "I enjoyed dissecting the pig heart and being able to look at all of the different structures. It was fun to be able to see and feel what we have been studying."
